## **Director emeritus** By PAULETTE AVERY

After graduating from the University of Oregon with a degree in music and music education, Lynn Sjolund, a native of Olympia, Wash., got his first music job teaching in Lebanon, Ore. A few years into his time there, a friend suggested he consider moving to Medford. Lynn didn't follow up on that until a 1956 call from the Medford School Superintendent. It was a job offer, including agreeing to hold open the job until Lynn was free to come about four weeks later. During his visit, he saw the junior high musical -- he says it was spectacular -- and he agreed to take the job as choral director at Medford High School.

At that time, it was somewhat of a tradition for the high school choral teacher to also direct the choir at First Presbyterian. Lynn took the church position and led both the chancel choir and a youth choir that sang each week at the early service. A highlight

of his years as choir director was putting on a performance of *Amahl and the Night Visitors* with both choirs. Current members Kathy Gordon, Ann Lowe, John Frohnmayer, Eric Smith, and Ginni Peterson were part of that production. Lynn also served several terms on Session.

At the urging of a group of choir members, Lynn founded the Rogue Valley Chorale, currently celebrating its 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary. During his tenure as director, Lynn took the chorale on seven trips to Europe and a performance at Carnegie Hall! He retired from the chorale 10 years ago after 40 years on the podium. He has been directing the chorus at Rogue Valley Manor since 2014, thus continuing to do what he loves.

During his long and illustrious career, Lynn served as president of both the Oregon Music Directors Association and the Northwest Music Educators Association. He also received an award from the Northwest Choral Directors Association and was the U of O Distinguished Alumnus in 2014, the only music major ever honored. The Oregon chapter of American Choral Directors Association named Lynn to their Hall of Fame in 2021.

He and his wife Doris, who often plays the piano and organ for us, have been married for 52 years.

Liberia's rubber plantation country. Pictures of the chairs, and of a celebration by the children, arrived here about two weeks ago.
