
# From the pastor's study

When I lived in Durham, North Carolina, our local movie theater was open to doing a festival of movies about faith, and I was asked to be on the committee to help choose the films for the festival. Our job was to come up with up to eight films that highlighted faith. We had our first meeting soon after, which turned out to be our last meeting as well.

The group was split into two very different sides. One side wanted to show only explicitly Christian movies, like Ben Hur, The Ten Commandments, and The Hiding Place. The other side, and I was on this side, wanted to show movies that help you think about Christian themes. Many of the movies we suggested were considered to be secular movies, but movies that made a point that Christians could discuss, like generosity, atonement, or

At one point during our meeting the side I was on was accused of not being Christian. The meeting never recovered from that remark and the theater owner realized that no matter which movies were chosen, it was going to be a controversial film festival, more controversial than the annual Gay and Lesbian film festival they sponsored.



Some people believe that for it to be Christian, it has to specifically mention God, or Jesus. I don't run with that crowd. I think it has to highlight Christian values, but not necessarily invoke the Bible or the names of God and Jesus. If it helps me think more constructively about our faith, then it may not be explicitly Christian, but it helps me be a better Christian.

In October we will continue looking at how movies can help us understand the Gospel better. We'll be looking first at Bruce Almighty, then The Fisher King, and then Driving Miss Daisy followed by a lesser-known film, Babette's Feast. If you are looking for something to watch in October, I can recommend all of these to you. (The Fisher King has more adult themes than the other movies.) Mike will pick up the series with It's a Wonderful Life. There are many things that help us understand our faith better, and I think these movies can help us. I hope during this series you find that to be true as well.

## Giardinelli returns for October Jazz Vespers

Guitar player Allen Giardinelli returns for Jazz Vespers on October 8, backed by two well-known musicians. Giardinelli, a newcomer to the Southern Oregon music scene, played vespers this past April.

Joining him for the 5 p.m. service are Mark Hamersly on bass and Theresa McCoy on drums.

Giardinelli's been a professional musician for three decades. Raised by two musicians – his mom was a classical violinist, his dad a progressive rocker and European talent scout for RCA records – Giardinelli writes on his Facebook page that after years of jazz guitar work, he's experimenting with blues, funk, and rock.

### Classical Vespers

Pianist Anna-Christina Streletz has the stage to herself for our October 22 Classical Vespers service. Her most recent appearance at vespers came as accompanist for Braydon Ross's French horn recital this August. Streletz appears with both Southern Oregon University and Rogue Community College musicians and presented a solo piano recital at Rogue Valley Manor on September 28.
