## From the pastor's study By Murray Richmond

One of the cool things I get to do as a pastor is hear what other people believe. When a person is ordained as a deacon or elder, they get to write a statement of faith which is presented to the Session. Many people, when told they have to write one, balk at the requirement.

I know why. Writing is difficult for many people, and to write about what you believe is deeply personal. Some people have not done a deep dive into their own beliefs, and when they do they usually find it a rewarding process.

Ministers have to write a statement of faith every time they start

work with a new congregation. This is the fourth congregation I have served, so over the last 30 or so years I have written four statements of faith. Each one was different because my own faith has grown and evolved over the years. I can see how it has deepened and matured.

What if you had to write a statement of faith? What would you say about what you believe? Imagine you had to write a statement of faith 20 years ago. What would you have said then, and how has your faith changed over the years?

In one of the more recent statements of faith the Session has received, the person actually wrote about how their faith has developed over the years. They started with a theological statement from their high school days, one that served them for a while. But then they started to really question their faith, and through that process began to grow in their faith.

The last part of their statement was a revisioning of that early statement, creating something similar, yet also very different.

This is where they are now: I believe in God the creator, infinite in wisdom, goodness, and love and in Jesus Christ, God incarnate, my Lord and Savior, who was crucified, died, rose and lives within and among us, and in the Holy Spirit, who takes the things of Christ and reveals to us, renewing, comforting, and inspiring the souls of all.

I encourage you to set aside some time, take up pen and paper, write "I believe..." and finish that sentence. It does not have to be long. It just has to be honest!
