Congressional help asked to unfreeze food distribution

Facing the possible loss of up to 40 percent of available foods through continuation of a federal freeze of the U.S. Department of Agriculture Emergency Food Assistance Program, Session this week asked Rep. Cliff Bentz (R-Oregon) for help.

The freeze, ordered shortly after installation of our new President in January, forced cancellation of many surplus food deliveries across the country. USDA's program purchased surplus commodities for distribution to food banks.

"As the governing body of First Presbyterian Church, we are very concerned about the future of the hungry in this community, and across the nation," said Session in its letter to Bentz.

Bentz, in his second term in Congress, is a member of the House subcommittee on Health, and is part of the House Rural Health caucus. His Oregon second congressional district includes vast farms which in past decades sold surplus crops to USDA.

Transition team listens


Mark Saturday, May 10 on your calendar for a report on what our Transition Team is learning about this congregation, and the community we serve. The location and time of the meeting is being worked out.

View from the Bridge

I write this article with strains of Jonas Nord-wall's arrangement of Jean Sebelius' Finlandia echoing in my mind. Long one of my favorites, Nordwall chose to close April's Classical Vespers program. Hearing it beautifully played on our equally beautiful organ will stay with me for a long time.

As a hymn, the lyrics are assuring: "Be still, my soul! the Lord is on your side"—truly music to "soothe a savage breast." As a whole, the piece (technically a "tone poem") evokes some of that

savagery.

Finlandia was originally part of a much larger composition written as a political protest against Czarist Russia. To avoid Russian censorship, it was performed under different names in a variety of concert venues. It was the music of the partisan underground. In that context, its dark and ominous opening assumes a whole new meaning.

Why is View from the Bridge offering a music review? Perhaps because Sibelius' dark and ominous view of his homeland's circumstances resembles our own. The first four minutes of Finlandia could be the soundtrack for Ephesians 6:11-12: ... For our struggle is not against blood and flesh but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers of this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places.

By any measure—climate change, shifting systems of global power, social/political volatility, or economic outlook—Paul's assessment of this present darkness plays in a minor chord. For us, it's the diminishing influence of mainline Protestant churches, the rise of Christian Nationalism, and an erosion of humanitarian values. We struggle in realms of spiritual darkness.

Of course, Paul's letter didn't leave the Ephesians in the dark. He closed with "Peace be to the whole community, and love with faith, from God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ."

Nor did Sibelius leave us in the dark. Near its end, calmness prevails with the serene and melodic Finlandia Hymn. Numerous hymn writers have lent lyrics to the tune. The one we know best, Be Still My Soul, is perhaps the most poignant:

Be still, my soul! your God does undertake
To guide the future as he has the past;
Your hope, your confidence, let nothing shake;
all now mysterious shall be bright at last.
Be still, my soul! the waves and winds still know
His voice who ruled them while he lived below.

For the pot-luck meal following the single 10:30 a.m. service, folks will be asked to prepare casseroles or salads from recipes found in the 185-page Centennial Cookbook published in 1985, when this congregation celebrated its first century.

At the potluck, you'll learn about the contents of a time capsule first installed when the Christan Education wing was built in 1952. It was most recently opened and contents added, in 2000. Folks at the potluck will be asked to
